# Mayor's Address

# A host to families in good times, a host to all in bad

We are a proud, hardworking, diverse, and welcoming community - and this was exemplified by our response to wildfire evacuations in the Northwest Territories last year.

More than 1,000 people came through our registration centre during the summer, while town staff worked round-the-clock for six

weeks to make sure everyone was taken care of and knew where they had to be. That experience garnered the town many positive reviews and words of thanks for our calm, committed work in a challenging time.

As part of the emergency response, we also hosted firefighters from around the world, as Peace River became known as a friendly and supportive host community.

Town administration hit its stride last year with three critical leaders now in place: Chief Administrative Officer Barbara Miller, Director of Corporate Services Samuel Mugford, and Director of Engineering and Infrastructure Patrick Fisher. The above, in addition to Director of Community Services Tanya Bell, are passionate, detail-oriented, and experienced professionals who are working hard to make our town more financially efficient while maintaining or increasing services.

With 12 parks and playgrounds, we are truly a perfect place to raise a family. The Baytex Centre was fully used in 2023, as was the Peace Regional Pool. Our Neighbourhood Improvement Program started up last year, with work completed around the Co-op store and more to be done in 2024.

Our council had previously committed to the purchase of a ladder truck for the Peace River Fire Department at a little over \$1.4 million, and that resource paid off last year as the truck was sent into service soon after it arrived for a rescue of a construction worker on the old Highway 2 bridge.

We responded to major slides on 101st Street and 103rd Street, which led us to start planning how to prevent those incidents in the future. In light of the circumstances we see with river breakups, slides, and wildfires, our Town has redoubled our emphasis on emergency preparedness and safety initiatives, regularly training staff of all levels so we are ready to take action for whatever comes our way.

In the fall, political advocacy became necessary to address the challenges of homelessness and social disturbances, especially with regards to people being dropped off downtown from the Peace River Correctional Centre. We initiated a campaign with the Province of Alberta requesting further resources or a change in policy at the correctional centre.

Going forward, we hope our community's social challenges lessen, and that there are routes and opportunities for those experiencing homelessness to find a better place in life.

We will continue to look at all grant opportunities to reduce the weight on our ratepayers, as well as working with the Peace Regional Healthcare Attraction and Retention Committee to attract and retain healthcare workers, along with the Peace River Economic Development Committee to grow our business community.

As a few more key staff are slated to join the Town, we are positioned well to keep our finances lean while progressing the beautiful community we call home.

We know that cost of living is top of mind for Canadians in the current economic climate, and I'm proud to have an administration behind our council that is focused on keeping life affordable.

We want to bring more people to Peace River, host more events, and show the rest of the country everything we have to offer.









# Building sustainability within



We are committed to enhancing our focus on emergency education, preparedness, and response, including setting new training requirements in the Incident Command System for our staff.

Building regional partnerships with adjacent municipalities is crucial and creates possibilities for exploring potential efficiencies, savings through economies of scale,

and opportunities for shared expertise. Enhanced lobbying efforts are ongoing to bring attention to the unique challenges faced by the Town of Peace River to provincial decision makers, as is the continued search for funding mechanisms to stabilize our millrate and help move our strategic plan forward.

Communication is set to be a key priority for 2024, with a focus on continuous improvement, efficiency, customer service, and economic development.

My priorities for 2024-2025 are outlined in the mandate letter available online. My focus word for 2024 is Fulfillment: ensuring our staff feel valued and fulfilled in their work and contributions to our residents' quality of life, the livelihoods of our business owners, and the enjoyment of our visitors.



# **Political Leadership**

The people elect the council; the council employs the CAO; the CAO and senior leadership administer the Town's services.



The Town of Peace River is governed by a dedicated Town Council composed of seven members, including the Mayor, Deputy Mayor, and five Councillors. Elected in the fall of 2021, the current council will serve until the next municipal election in the fall of 2025.

The Council is responsible for developing town policies, overseeing their implementation through the Chief Administrative Officer, who is the only employee of Council.

Council meets regularly on each second and fourth Monday of the month, with additional Governance and Priorities

meetings as established during the annual organizational meeting in October. These meetings are open to the public, providing residents an opportunity to engage with their elected representatives. They are also livestreamed to allow the public to view from anywhere.

The council members work collectively to address community needs, enhance municipal services, and ensure sustainable development. Their efforts are focused on improving the quality of life for all residents, fostering economic growth, and maintaining Peace River as a vibrant and welcoming community.


#### Tanya Bell

# **Community Services**



#### **Department Reorganization**

The Community Services Department restructured in 2023, promoting the Recreation Facilities Coordinator to Manager of Recreation and Parks and creating a new Parks Lead position to enhance park services.

## **Capital Projects**

#### **Peace Regional Pool Hot Tub**

Initiated reconstruction of the hot tub in 2023, facing challenges like additional leaks and compliance with flow standards, with tendering planned for 2024.

#### **Ski Hill Condition Assessment**

A comprehensive infrastructure and building condition assessment was completed at the ski hill to aid in future capital and maintenance planning.

## **Grant Programs**

#### Peace Region 55+ Games Legacy Grant

Over \$40,000 in surplus funds from the 2022 AB 55+ Games were distributed as grants to various community organizations for equipment and programs.

#### Family and Community Support Services

Four organizations received grants for student supports, mental health awareness, childcare, and youth center programs.

## **Emergency Social Services**

#### Regional Wildfires - May

Community Services staff prepared and implemented the Emergency Social Services Plan during a record-breaking wildfire season.

#### Little Buffalo Fire - June 30

Community Services assisted evacuees from Little Buffalo, setting up a Reception Centre at Athabasca Hall

#### Northwest Territories Fires - Aug. 13 - Sept. 24

The Town provided registration and information services for evacuees, eventually expanding to lodging and food services for Yellowknife and other areas, with significant community support. A total of 1,260 evacuees were registered in Peace River during this event.

#### **Taxi Pass**

#### **Program Review**

An extensive review of the Taxi Pass Program

was conducted, resulting in updated policies and an increase in active users to 186 by the end of 2023.

# **Peace River Museum, Archives** and Mackenzie Centre

#### **Roof Repairs**

A new roof was installed in July 2023 to address leaking issues, with further repairs planned for 2024.

#### **Summer Programming**

The museum had a busy summer with various events and guided tours, also supporting the Evacuation Centre during fires.

#### **Exhibits**

New exhibits showcased uniforms and aviation history in Peace River, with interactive elements from the Canada Aviation and Space Museum.

#### **Outreach and Partnerships**

The museum partnered with community groups for events and classes, supporting First Nations peoples and cultural activities.

#### **NAR Station and Tourist Information**

The Tourist Information Centre operated seasonally, hosting educational tours, summer teas, and Dungeons and Dragons events, while removing a deteriorating railway caboose.

# **Recreation Programs**

#### **Summer Fun and Camp Adventure**

Popular summer day camps provided unique recreational experiences for children, with high attendance and waitlists.

#### **Outdoor Concert Series**

Three outdoor concerts showcased local talent

in community parks, attracting approximately 200 attendees.

#### **Light Up the Park**

The November 24 event at Riverfront Park attracted approximately 1,000 people with volunteer support.

## **Baytex Energy Centre**

#### **Concession Operator**

CK Next Generation was awarded the concession contract for 2023 and 2024.

#### **Facility Usage**

Overall the ice and fieldhouse saw increased use in comparison to the previous year, with more than 2,700 hours of ice use and more than 5,200 hours of courts use.

### Parks and Outdoor

#### Saddleback Playground

The playground's plastic border was replaced with a wooden border due to deterioration and safety concerns.

#### Athabasca Hall

#### **Main Events**

Hosted various events, including performing arts, dance festivals, farmers markets, children's productions, and a Christmas dinner theatre, resulting in more than 2,770 hours booked at the facility.

# **Peace Regional Pool**

#### **Staffing and Training**

The pool is a major training center for the North, providing required training for local organizations.

#### **Programming**

New programs like the Mermaid Club and Adult Mermaid Fitness were introduced, with positive feedback.

The pool was awarded for its large National Lifeguard program in a small community.

The Home Support Program saw an increase in clients and service hours, while the Meals on Wheels Program delivered more meals compared to the previous year.

#### **Volunteer Income Tax Program**

Assisted low-income individuals with income tax filings.

#### **Seniors Week**

Celebrated with a luncheon, live music, dance, and prizes, attracting more than 160 seniors.

Participated in creating an Anti-discrimination Response Training program unique to Alberta.

#### **Peace River Family Day Event**


Expanded Family Day celebrations with various activities, upping attendance from previous years to more than 900 people.

# **Corporate and Protective Services**

#### **Finance**

#### **Evacuee Assistance**

Assisted with the Evacuation Centre and managed invoicing for meal vouchers, totaling over \$185,000.

#### **Utility Billing**

Converted to end-of-month utility billing for improved efficiency and better information for ratepayers.

#### **Protective Services**

#### **Equipment Upgrades**

Converted two Town-owned pickup trucks into Fire Department Command and Squad Units.

#### **ICS Training**

Provided Incident Command System training to Town staff and regional partners.

#### **Calls Increased**

Major increase in wildfire responses and alarm calls. Call volume increased by 29% compared to the previous two years, with 414 calls in 2023.

#### **Ladder Truck**

Purchased a new ladder truck, providing firefighters increased tools to deal with emergencies.

### Northern Hands-on Education and Awareness Training (HEAT) Fire Conference

More than 60 firefighters participated in 23<sup>rd</sup> annual event in Peace River.

## **Systems Administration**

#### Help Desk Support

Addressed 480 tickets in 2023, with an average resolution time of 30 minutes.

#### **Dark Web Monitoring**

Set up dark web monitoring, with the first scan scheduled for January 2024.

#### **Server Patching**

Completed server patching to update underlying software, as well as full inventory and condition assessment of IT networks and equipment for asset management planning.

## **Employee Services**

#### **Health and Safety Audit**

Conducted an internal audit to maintain COR status, with planning starting in September and audit work in October and November.

#### **Safety System Rollout**

Purchased and started utilizing Salus Pro electronic safety system to centralize records.

#### **Four-Day Workweek Pilot**

Finance staff participated in a pilot program for a four-day workweek.

# **Engineering and Infrastructure**

The Engineering and Infrastructure Department employs 31 permanent positions under three major divisions: Public Works, Planning and Development, and Water/Wastewater Treatment.

In addition to providing services within these major areas, the department also handles capital planning and projects and administers the waste management contracts on behalf of the Town of Peace River. In 2023 we experienced a leadership change in the department and are expecting the new director, Pat Fisher, to help implement a more robust asset management program and modernize our operations functions.

## **Capital Projects**

#### **Neighbourhood Infrastructure Renewal**

This \$2.8M project was a major refresh of municipal infrastructure on 95th Avenue that was to be constructed over two seasons. Water, sewer, and stormwater improvements on 95th Avenue in Peace River were completed by our hired contractor in 2023. Full completion is expected in 2024 when new roadway and sidewalk will be installed on this block and the streetlights will be installed.

#### **Town Hall Main Entrance Accessibility**

This federally funded project was completed in 2024 to install new ramp handrails and new doors with electronic operators to improve access to the front offices of Town Hall for residents who have mobility challenges.

### **Asphalt Overlay and Sidewalk Replacement Program**

Tendered late in 2023, this project was to complete a number of road patches throughout town and replace a significant amount of curb and sidewalk along 91 Street in Lower West Peace. Due to some delays getting started, the work will be finished early in the construction season of 2024.

#### **Main Street Concrete Repair**

Completed installation of the first year of a multi-year program looking to replace the paving stones, which have begun to shift and create tripping concerns, with a properly placed concrete sidewalk.

## **Planning and Development**

Our planning and development consists of four permanent staff and a manager. As a department, we process development permits for properties, stickhandle legislated planning documents, are the subdivision authority for the Town of Peace River, and run an accredited safety codes program for building permits. In 2023, we issued 47 development permits and 28 building permits worth a construction value of over \$10.8M. Did you know our average time to issue a development permit for a complete application is less than 5 days?

#### **Active Transportation Plan**

Initiated the Active Transportation Plan, which provides a framework for planning active transportation (trails, bike routes, and sidewalks) into the future.

#### **Business Grant Funding**

Launched the Business Grant Funding program, which budgeted \$50,000 for local businesses to



receive assistance in facility upgrades.

#### Land Use Bylaw

Restarted work on our Land Use Bylaw to rewrite and make it easier for citizens and businesses to navigate the development process.

#### **Public Works**

Our public works team consists of 12 machine operators, two facility maintenance staff, and two supervisors. It is responsible for road maintenance, road sweeping, sidewalk repairs, snow clearing, ice control, water distribution, and sewer collection, in addition to providing maintenance assistance for all of our Townowned facilities.

Did you know that we have someone on call 24/7 with our public works department? If you are experiencing a utility emergency afterhours our public works phone (780-264-3085) is transferred to a call center which will dispatch one of our staff to look into the issue.

#### **CityWorks**

Implemented a new system that integrates with our utility maps and allows our team to track both internal and external calls for service, assign and track resources, and maintain a better history so we are less likely to miss a request that comes in. The department has widely adopted this and we look forward to rolling this out in other areas of the organization in 2024 and 2025.

## Water and Wastewater Treatment

Our water and wastewater treatment team has 6 staff and manages 2 treatment facilities, 6 sewage lift stations, 4 water reservoirs, and all of our utility metering to provide service to local residents, businesses and multiple water coops. These facilities run 24/7 in a heavily regulated environment requiring daily testing.
